Mission, Purpose and Objective

The purpose of **Petra University** is to train church leaders and ministers in their chosen areas and in their personal lives via the application of Christian conservative reformed faith. Instructional Programs Semester Cycle:

Petra University operates on a traditional semester cycle of instruction. Each academic program cycle is [14] contact hours of instruction for each semester unit of credit, including formal examination periods but excluding holidays.

Distance Education Program:

Students may take course work at their home and in their mission field. They may proceed with their course work at their own pace. We regularly check upon and encourage our distance-learning students. We provide CD, video, mail, textbooks and internet to have more convenient study.

Approximate Elapsed Time for Evaluation of Assignments:

The Distance Learning Department will do all in its power to evaluate student assignments and tests in a timely manner and notify students of grades of deficiencies. In most cases Distance Learning students should receive an evaluation of tests and assignments within ten (10) working days of receipt, with the exception of certain projects and dissertations that require more time to evaluate. If more than thirteen (13) working days have elapsed without receiving an evaluation, please contact the Distance Learning office and request an update on the status of your assignment.

Facilities:

Admission Standards and Procedures

Policy of Non-Discrimination:

Petra University admission policy does not discriminate on the basis of race, age, gender, or physical disability. Further, the university's commitment to non-discrimination extends to the areas of educational policy development and implementation, religious preference, and applications for admission.

To Apply:

Individuals desiring information or applications regarding the academic degree programs offered by **Petra University** may telephone the Admissions Office at (213) 210-3877 or visit the university at 866 S. Westmoreland Ave. # 201, Los Angeles, CA 90005. Office hours are 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday, except for holidays.

Applicant Processing:

Each prospective student seeking admission to the university is interviewed to ascertain his/her aptitude for the degree program of interest. A planned sequence of required and elective courses for the degree program is discussed, as are the academic requirements of the university, degree program contract, and schedule of fees. In addition, the student is advised that, upon admission to **Petra University**, the language of instruction is primarily Korean or translated from other languages into Korean, so that written and oral language proficiency in Korean is necessary.

The admission criteria adopted by **Petra University** assure that applicants are evaluated on the basis of academic and professional backgrounds and on the potential for professional growth. The following application documents are required to serve as a basis for

determining the applicant's satisfaction of the university's admission requirements:

- A completed application form;
- Two personal references, with at least one reference from the applicant's pastor or church governing board;
- A 2-page essay that includes a brief autobiography, a summary of the applicant's previous vocational experiences, and a description of his/her theological convictions as related to the Christian ministry;
- Official transcripts for all previous college and seminary work;
- A non-refundable \$100.00 application fee; and
- A personal interview.

As a prospective student, you are encouraged to review this catalog prior to signing an enrollment agreement. You are also encouraged to review the School Performance Fact Sheet, which must be provided to you prior to signing an enrollment agreement.

Transfer Policy:

Upon receipt of an applicant's official transcripts, completed application requesting credit transfer, and catalog descriptions of completed courses,

Petra University Department Chairs, the Academic Dean, and the Registrar review these materials to determine equivalency with the universities existing course content. A decision is made regarding credits that are suitable for transfer to the university and are applicable to the degree program sought.

Department Chairs are responsible for evaluation and approving transfer credits based on a review of other institutions course content in comparison to the equivalency criteria established by **Petra University**.

The Academic Dean and President are responsible for implementing the university's credit transfer policy. The process for monitoring transfer evaluation is based on policy that is individualized and continuing based on the student's submission of the above-specified documentation detailing the prior satisfaction of degree requirements and subject to the stated transfer policy credit limitations.

Language of Instruction:

All classroom instruction is provided in the Korean language, or translated into Korean if the professor's primary language is English. Because of the complex nature of the Bible and its interpretations, and to enhance student comprehension, follow-up explanations and discussions also are provided in the Korean language.

Policy on Reservation of Rights:

Petra University reserves the right to:

- Change its policies, tuition and fee schedule, and campus site without prior notice;
- Refuse admission to any applicant
- Place on probation, suspend, and dismiss any student at the discretion of

the President.

Policy for Ensuring Academic Freedom:

Faculty members at **Petra University** are free to express their individual perspectives in their teaching, writings, and publications whether in matters of theology or academic course work and research interpretation.

Students also are free to explore and express their own interpretations of their research with the assurance that faculty members ensure the academic freedom of expression of students by encouraging exploratory inquiry into controversial issues, analyzing the underlying premises, and offering a platform for discussion.

Student Records:

Enrollees are advised and cautioned that state law requires this educational institution to maintain school and student records for no longer than a five-year period, with the exception of transcripts.

- All fees must be paid by the end of each term, unless otherwise arranged with the School Office.
- No transcript will be issued until all financial debts have been paid.
- No prepayment for an entire degree program is permitted.

Right to Cancel and Refund Policy:

The student has the right to cancel the Enrollment Agreement and obtain a refund of charges paid through attendance at the first class session or the seventh day after enrollment, whichever is later. The university will issue the student a full refund of all charges, including those labeled Non-Refundable, less the Application Fee and charges for unreturned equipment.

Refunds:

If a student cancels all classes on or before the first class session or the seventh day after enrollment, whichever is later, he or she shall receive a 100% refund. If scheduled courses are canceled, students will receive a full refund. If the student withdraws after the full refund period, refund is prorated in accordance with the following pro-rata refund policy.

The exact amount of prorated refund will be based on the above formula. The following table provides the estimated amount of refund at each point of withdrawal:

Any course requirement due in a course that has not been turned in by the time of final

examination or failure to take the final examination will be assigned the grade of F. A student who obtain san approval from the course instructor to turn in the required work within a stipulated later time or take the late final examination may receive the grade of I. The ‘I’ grade is awarded for compelling reasons, such as medical, as deemed appropriate by the instructor in charge of the course. All course requirements that are due must be completed no later than the end of the next semester.

Ethical Principles:

Petra University prides itself in admitting students whose personal ethics and behavior ensure quality pursuit of academic excellence, citizenship, deportment, and morality. Academic honesty and personal integrity are expected as intrinsic qualities in class work and written papers. Should the principles of ethical behavior be violated, however, the university shall first discuss the charges with the student, issue a warning if necessary, or dismiss the student. The protocol of **Petra University** is to follow Due Process procedures by notifying the student in writing of the charges, provide an opportunity for the student to counter the charges, and explain the process for appealing the decision.

Policy on Probation, Suspension, Dismissal:

A student may be placed on probation, suspended, or dismissed as a result of behavior that is in violation of the Christian principles on which **Petra University** is founded. In taking such action, the nature of the infraction is carefully weight and the principles of Due Process are followed. Infractions that are considered grounds for university action include.

Cheating: The intentional use of materials without giving source credit, copying papers or test answers from another student, submitting ones own work that has been submitted previously in another course, copying test answers from secreted notes, or any other act which serves to defraud the academic process of the university.

Plagiarism: Copying another work verbatim, without permission or credit as to source, or paraphrasing another work without citing the source.

Sexual Harassment: Intentional unwelcome advances of sexual nature, whether verbal, visual, or physical.

Destruction of Property: The intentional destruction or abuse of university property.

Disruptive Acts of Expression: The intentional disruption of university operations, classroom misconduct, verbal and/or written threats, or interference with the instructional process.

Programs and Course Requirements

The primary purpose of **Petra University** is to offer undergraduate and graduate theological curricula to equip students for Christian ministry as ordained ministers, lay leaders, Christian educators, missionary workers, and youth ministers.

It also is the purpose of the university to encourage individuals to develop a strong Christian commitment and integrity. Students will be exposed to a nucleus of courses that will equip them with appropriate professional knowledge and skills essential for their chosen field of service and ministerial activity.

Required courses are designed so students will have an opportunity to choose a specialized

About The Distance Learning Correspondence Program:

Petra University now offers a distance learning correspondence program, enabling students who are incapable of attending classes at the main campus, to complete them in the convenience of their homes. All correspondence classes will have the identical syllabi, professors' handouts, manuals; study guides, texts, reading assignments and tests as the classes taught on campus. Cassette or CD recoding and videos of professors actual lectures will also be provided and become required listening via internet or through mailings. Correspondence students will be responsible for all tuition and text fees as for campus classes, as well as for all additional shipping fees for receiving and returning class materials (that cannot be sent via email).

Students will be allowed the convenience of studying and completing correspondence courses at their own pace. However, since the University has the same professors mentoring distance learning students, and their class work, as they do their campus students, the University therefore expects correspondence students to complete all assignments within a maximum period of two semesters and to have all required fees paid in full during the semester in which they receive the class materials. Correspondence students may choose whatever classes are of greatest interest to them, but it is also necessary that they seek the

counsel of the University's Academic Dean (via phone or e-mail), when planning their class requirements for their required degree program.

With each correspondence class, students will also be provided information as to how to contact their mentoring professor, in order that the learning experience received at home is as enjoyable, thorough and consistent as they would have attending the same class on campus.

1) Bachelor in Theology (Total 126 units)

Purpose: The purpose of the Bachelor in Theology program is to enable students to explore the Christian faith in an academic setting. The foundation of the program is knowledge of the Scripture, which is acquired through courses in the Old and New Testaments. Further, classes in systematic and historical theology allow for in-depth consideration of important doctrine, practices and traditions.

Description: Students receive the Bachelor in Theology degree when they complete: a minimum of 126 semester units; Required Biblical Languages: (6) units; Required Bible Courses: (39) units; Required Theology Courses (18) units; Required Church History Courses: (6) units; Required Counseling and Education Courses: (15) units; Required Ministry Courses: (42) units. A minimum full-time course load is (12) units per semester. A maximum full-time load is (21) units per semester; however, students may petition for additional units if their cumulative average is 3.0.

Required Bible Languages (6 units)

LG 344 Introduction to Biblical Hebrew (3 u)

This Course studies the basic grammar of the Hebrew language and includes translation and written exercises of selected biblical texts. An important part of the course will emphasize the language in written exercises.

LG 345 Introduction to New Testament Greek (3 u)

This course is an introductory study of the basic elements of New Testament Greek. It is designed for students who have not completed a full sequence of beginning Greek courses, emphasizing grammar, syntax and vocabulary.

Required Bible Study Courses (48 units)**NT 301 New Testament Survey (3 u)**

This course survey the New Testament, Its books, their authorship and the political, social, moral, and religious backgrounds of the New Testament and inter- testament periods.

NT 302 Introduction to the Three Gospels (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of selected passages from the texts of the 3 Gospels that includes discussion of background issues such as history, composition, authorship, and distinction of each book.

NT 303 Gospel John (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of selected portion of the fourth Gospel, comparing and contrasting its unique historical and theological presentation with the other synoptic gospels.

NT 304 Acts (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of selected portions with special consideration of the contribution of the book of Acts to the knowledge of the expansion and life of the early church.

NT 305 Romans (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of the book of Romans, with special emphasis upon the Soteriology of Paul contained therein.

NT 306 1, 2 Corinthians (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of select portions, with special emphasis upon the urban paganism, religions and Greco Roman Philosophies prevalent in Corinth, which caused such challenges Paul addressed in this great Epistle.

NT 307 Galatians / Ephesians (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of select portions, studying Paul's great themes of sanctified relationships in the Body of Christ, the foundations of the Church and victorious Christian living.

NT 308 Philippians / Colossians (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of these two prison epistles of Paul, with special review of his most seasoned themes therein of the triumph of Christ over sin, cultural paganism and spiritual adversities.

NT 309 1, 2 Thessalonians / 1,2 Timothy (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of these epistles, emphasizing especially Paul's eschatology and disposition of the Church in the last days.

NT 310 Hebrew (3 u)

This course is an analysis and exposition of the text, with attention to authorship, date, theme, and interpretive difficulties. Special emphasis is also given to Christ's fulfillment of the types and shadows of the Old Testament sacrificial system.

NT 311 James (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of the epistle, exploring its emphasis upon the character building properties of trials and the demand for faith as evidenced by works.

NT 312 1, 2 Peter (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of these two general epistles, exploring their emphasis especially upon Christology, election, Biblical inspiration, sanctification, and the dynamics of godly character formation of church leadership.

NT 313 1, 2 & 3 John / Jude (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of these general epistles, with special detailing of the themes of dynamics discipleship and tests of authentic faith in believers.

NT 314 Revelation (3 u)

This course is an exegetical study of select passages, reviewing particularly the eschatological themes as presented, with all the various interpretation, which have arisen in modern theological discussion of the text.

OT 302 Pentateuch (3 u)

This course includes Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy. It is an exegetical study of the Law; reviewing the historicity of the creation account and establishment of Israel, emphasizing upon its record of Israel's salvation history, and analyzing its various moral, ceremonial and sacrifice precepts, and observing the Law.

OT 303 Psalms (3 u)

This course examines the events in the life of the various contributing psalmist and especially those in David, which gave rise to the theology contained in their poems.

OT 304 Prophets (3 u)

This course survey the historical backgrounds and significant themes contained in the major and minor Prophets, with exegesis of select passages related to Messianic prophecies.

Required Theology Courses (15 U)**TH 334 Systematic Theology(I): The Doctrine of God(3 u)**

This course examines the doctrines of revelation and Scripture; the doctrines of God, His attributes and Trinitarian mode of existence; the doctrine of creation and providence.

TH 335 Systematic Theology(II): The Doctrine of God's Image(3 u)

This course examines the doctrines of human and Scripture; the origin and nature of humankind; and the doctrine of fall and sin.

TH 336 Systematic Theology(III): Soteriology(3 u)

This course examines the doctrines of divine calling, regeneration, repentance, faith, justification, adoption, and sanctification will be detailed. Saved by God's grace will be instructed.

TH 337 Systematic Theology(IV): Christology(3 u)

This course examines the doctrine of divine election, the covenant of grace, and the person work of Christ the Mediator. Jesus is the perfect Son and Man as the Savior who redeems all sin of people.

TH 338 A Study of The Holy Spirit (3 u)

This course discovers biblical understanding of the Holy Spirit and its ministry; who the Holy Spirit is, what he does, where he came from, and how he

communicate with his creatures.

Required History Courses (6 units)

CH 348 World Church History 1 (3 u)

This course is a survey of the main events and theological developments of the Christian church from the close of the New Testament era to the modern period.

HT 334 Korean Church History (3 u)

This course studies the beginnings of missionary outreach to mainland South Korea, its denominational developments, and expansion of the Korean Church throughout the world.

Required Counseling and Education Courses (15 units)

CE 333 Christian Education (3 u)

An overview of Christian education theory and practice, primary as it relates to the local Church, Opportunities are provided to evaluate curriculum and to interact with current issues related to Christian education.

PC 331 Introduction to Christian Counseling (3 u)

This course approaches the study of Christian Counseling by integrating Biblical insights with practical directives for some of the most prominent counseling concerns facing Christians and the Church today.

PC 332 Personality Development (3 u)

This course focuses on personality development from early childhood to adulthood, with special attention given to physical, cognitive, socio-emotional, moral and faith aspects of human development. Areas of study will include social skills, relational capacities, gender and role learning and socialization. Human personality development will be viewed from the Christian perspective.

PC 355 Husband and Wife Relationship (3 u)

This course studies the Biblical roles of husband and wife as taught in select Old and New Testament passages, emphasizing the sacramental nature of marriage and Divine design for a couple as a ministry team.

PC 334 Biblical Models for Marriage and Family Counseling (3 u)

This course presents models for personality, partnership, and parenthood within a biblical context and with a view to identifying techniques and strategies for improving skills in pastoral, individual, marriage, and family counseling.

Required Ministry Courses (39 unit)

AS 311 Creation Science (3 u)

This course analyses the contemporary debate between Biblical creationism and modern scientific evolutionary theories, reviewing the latest scientific research and how it confirms the Genesis account of creation.

BI 322 Basic Botany (3 u)

This course studies plants, fruits and vegetable gardening; relevant to the growing of wholesome and nutritious foods, which contribute to a healthy diet, in accordance with Biblical insights.

BS 336 Prayer (3 u)

This is a practical course that introduces the student to the major passages of Scriptures that discuss and analyze prayer, thanksgiving, praise, fasting and intercession.

CG 355 Cell Based Church (3 u)

This course offers an in depth study of small group ministries, as they relate to discipleship of the membership, evangelism and church growth. Select systems of

mega Church Pastors will be detailed.

CL 356 Christian Leadership (3 u)

This course will survey the Biblical and ideal qualifications for Christian Leaders in Church and Para Church ministries, and how to effectively train leaders in the Church. Servant hood after the style of Jesus will be the basis of study.

CM 325 Youth Ministry (3 u)

This course is a study of youth ministry from event planning to methodology of youth ministries and includes input from several successful youth ministries and Christian educators.

CM 370 Church Planting (3 u)

This course will present the student with the best of contemporary insights from prominent and highly successful Church planters. Indigenous missions growth and development of satellite Churches will be detailed.

CM 378 Church and Society (3 u)

This significant class will familiarize the student with both basic and nonprofit corporate Law, which determines the interrelation of the Church to the government and society.

CO 367 Effective Communication (3 u)

This course studies the most effective ways of presenting ideas in written and oral presentations, reviewing the power of material organization, voice inflection and body language in speeches and sermons.

CO 355 Anthropology (3 u)

This course will introduce the student to means and ways of overcoming prejudice, language barriers, and differing cultural mores in settings where there are cohabitating diverse cultures. Emphasis will detail the basic differences between

Western and Eastern cultures.

EM 377 Evangelism (3 u)

This course presents the biblical and theological basis for evangelism and includes the methods and message of converting non-believers to Christ.

EM 356 City Evangelism (3 u)

This course will acquaint the student with urban and mega Church growth programs, which constitute the Church as a community resource center, as a means to evangelistic outreach and growth.

EM 347 Effective Evangelism (3 u)

This course will study Evangelism in the New Testament and the early and contemporary Church, so as to prepare the student to train others for effective personal evangelism and orchestrate the Church membership into an evangelizing entity.

MS 377 Missiology (3 u)

This class will survey the qualifications necessary for becoming a missionary, how to raise necessary funds, and how to develop missions and indigenous church growth movements in foreign missionary settings.

MU 301 Fundamentals of Church Music (3 u)

This course is concerned with the fundamentals of church music, the principles of sacred music, and the practical applications of life and worship in the contemporary church. Also introduced are the elements of music including pitch and rhythm symbols, meter and time signatures, melody, scales, intervals, and chord structure.

PM 322 Introduction to Christian Ministry (3 u)

This course explores biblical principles regarding the scope of pastoral ministry and includes preaching, teaching, counseling, administration, visitation, prayer meetings, church leadership, and stewardship.

PR 323 Introduction to Sermon Preparation / Homiletics (3 u)

This course introduces sermon preparation and delivery, the principles and practices of effective verbal communication, types of sermons, analysis of sermons by noted preachers, and outlining and structuring a sermon combined with adaptation to the audience.

PR 324 Sermon Delivery Practicum (3 u)

This course focuses on practicing the delivery of various types of sermons, vocal production, articulation, projection, and style in order to develop more effective communication skills.

PS 300 Introduction to Psychology (3 u)

This course is a study of the nature of man and human behavior with special attention given to those factors associated with the development of personality, behavior patterns, and strategies for dealing with stress.

RE 301 World Religions (3 u)

This course surveys and compares the major religions of Buddhism, Confucianism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Taoism and Christianity.

SD 377 Gifts of the Holy Spirit/Development (3 u)

This course details all the known gifts of the Holy Spirit as presented in the New Testament, the nature, purpose and administration of each, and how the student can flourish personally in the gifts and inspire others in their own.

SG 333 Discipleship (3 u)

This course is designed to equip the student with the ability to effectively teach and exemplify the Word, so as to train and mature the various age groups of the local Church, using the models of Jesus with the disciples and Paul with Timothy and Titus.

SG 373 Small Group Bible Study (3 u)

This class will study the effective ways in which to develop small group Bible studies in the local Church, as a part of its Christian Education program, and as a means of developing dynamic and intimate support groups which strengthen Body life and essential follow-up ministries.

AL 321 Literature (3 u)

This course covers written and spoken materials from creative writing to more technical and scientific works. It also presents the creative imagination including works of poetry, drama, fiction, and nonfiction.

PH 322 Aesthetics(3 u)

This course is a study of beauty in nature. It will explore the study of emotional value, shape, texture, color, type of material, symmetry and simplicity of the repeated pattern used in the design.

TH 301 Theology of Christian Life (3 u)

This course examines selected important aspects of Christian life including: regeneration, repentance, faith, reconciliation, sanctification, forgiveness, worship, evangelism, fellowship, stewardship, and freedom.

WM 387 Worship Renewal (3 u)

This class offers the student a continuing and advanced study of praise and worship as presented in the Old Testament, training the student how to develop more

effective music ministry in the local Church, and as a means of using music and song to bring about renewal and church growth.

WM 323 Worship Practicum (3 u)

This class allows the student to apply the information and training learned from classes on praise and worship to his/her own church music ministry. The student will keep a journal regarding the music and songs and their styles selected during each weekly service, and the effects upon the congregational worshippers. The student will also be expected to develop a proposed program of worship and praise for every age group of the congregation, documenting the effectiveness in each case.

2) Master of Biblical Counseling (Total 48 units)

Purpose: The purpose of the Master of Biblical Counseling program is to educate students for Biblical ministries requiring counseling.

Description: It is based on an integrated study of the Bible, Christian theology, counseling philosophies and modalities of treatment; developing counseling skills in a variety of contexts. This course requires 32 units of class course work and a thesis of 8 units. Additionally, all students are required to have a supervised internship of 200 hours of counseling practicum during the degree program.

Bible Core Courses (12 units)

OT 500 Old Testament Survey (3 u)

This course presents the content of Old Testament literature and various approaches for its interpretation. Both social and theological milieu of the Old Testament world will be introduced.

NT 500 New Testament Survey (3 u)

This course surveys the New Testament, focusing on the political, social, moral, and religious backgrounds of the inter-testament period, and that of Jesus and the apostles.

NT 501 Jesus' Ministry (3 u)

This course will pursue the study of Jesus' divine self-awareness and anointing; His

authority and methods of ministry, prayer and compassion.

NT 502 Paul's Ministry (3 u)

This course will survey Paul's methodology and solutions to problems that arose in the churches in which he planted as recorded in his epistles.

Counseling Generals (30 units)

BC 511 Biblical Counseling (3 u)

This course challenges students to rethink the Bible with the spiritual, personal, and relational needs of others in mind and with the goal of constructing a sound biblical method for understanding and helping people through biblical counseling in a church ministry context.

BC 513 Holistic healing (3 u)

This course will deal with the problems of our whole being; body, soul, spirit incorporating into the healing process the modalities of prayer and spiritual counseling with effective counseling techniques.

CI 531 Issues of Biblical Counseling (3 u)

This course explores the biblical, theological, and practical issues of biblical counseling within the church.

CI 533 Post-Modern Social Issues (3 u)

This course investigates the controversial issues that are prevalent in society and the social welfare systems; discussing in-depth the underlying implications with a goal to understanding biblical answers.

BC 550 Biblical Counseling for Marriage and Family (3 u)

This course explores theoretical foundations of Christian family life from the perspective of biblical counseling, with emphasis on learning practical skills and techniques of biblical counseling to assess, interpret, and resolve marital and

family problems.

BC 551 Methods and Techniques of Biblical Counseling (3 u)

This course focuses on the major techniques and strategies of biblical counseling that can be appropriately and effectively used to diagnose and define the problem, determine biblical counseling alternatives for treatment, and provide biblical guidance and assistance to resolving the problem.

BC 552 Biblical Counseling in Crisis Situations (3 u)

This course examines the theoretical views of biblical counseling as applied to crisis situations; its relation to family and social systems; the nature and management of crisis situations; and the relationship between the therapist, client, and community resources. It focuses on developing caring strategies for ministry to persons with unusual difficulties to those victimized by acute trauma from biblical, theoretical, and practical perspectives.

BC 554 Husband and Wife Relationship (3 u)

The knowledge, techniques, and experience of husband and wife relationship will be introduced and shared each other. It deals with many cases, which were generally arisen among Korean societies.

BC555 Biblical Counseling for Contemporary Premarital Issues (3 u)

This course examines the theory and practical techniques in biblically-based premarital counseling, including those skills necessary to administer, scale, and interpret instruments appropriate to such counseling. It focuses on contemporary premarital issues and their dynamics and dilemma of biblical counseling.

BC 558 Practicum Biblical Counseling (Supervised) (3 u)

This course is a hands-on application of BC552 and includes practical experience in observing and practicing within a supervised context the conceptual and

procedural methods and techniques from that course, plus a critique of live and taped counseling sessions.

BC 560 Contemporary Issues in Pastoral Care (3 u)

This course examines significant aspects of pastoral care, including theological and psychological perspectives on current ministry issues, the relationship between pastoral care and secular modes of helping, management of the pastoral encounter, and impact of issues on a church in developing specific plan of ministry.

BC 561 Pastoral Care and Community Resources (3 u)

This course studies the resources in pastoral care available in an urban setting such as in hospitals, jails, welfare agencies, mental health centers, and juvenile rehabilitation centers.

RT 570 Research Methods and Thesis Proposal (3 u)

This course is based on faculty directed research on topics on research interest and degree emphasis of the student and includes the submission of an approved thesis proposal.

RT 692 Thesis (3 u)

This course is faculty directed and is a continuation of the research approved in the thesis proposal. It may be repeated until the thesis is approved.

3) Master of Christian Education (48 units)

Purpose: The primary purpose of the Master of Christian Education is to equip motivate students to become competent leaders in the educational ministries of churches. This degree is the foundational degree for one preparing for ministry in Christian Education. Objectives of the program seek to encourage the student to develop skills for the performance of ministry and to strive for personal excellence in pursuing a ministry in Christian Education.

Description: Students receive the Master of Christian Education degree when they complete: a minimum of 36 semester units; Required Bible Courses: (9) units; Required Theology Courses (12) units; Required Education Courses: (27) units. A minimum full-time course load is (12) units per semester. A maximum full-time load is (20) units per semester; however, students may petition for additional units if their cumulative average is 3.0.

TH 538 A Study of The Holy Spirit (3 u)

ET 501 Christian Ethics (3 u)

This course explores structure and content of Christian ethics; goal, motive and norm of the Christian life; analysis of ethical issues of authority, life, sexuality, property and truthfulness.

CE 501 History of Christian Education (3 u)

This course represents brief history and importance of Christian education in the local church; organization of the church's educational program; planning and development; leadership recruitment and training; staff relationships.

CE 503 Philosophy of Christian Education (3 u)

This course reveals an examination of the biblical and theological foundations Christian education; development of a personal philosophy of Christian education which is both biblical and practical.

CE 509 Field Education—Effective Teaching (3 u)

This course explores preparation and presentation of various styles of lessons, such

as; visual aid's drama, puppets, news reports, pantomime, quizzes, puzzles, and games.

CE 511 Childhood Education (Children and Adults) (3 u)

Methods of ministry to handicapped or uniquely gifted people; professional advice provided; methods for reaching those in the community with special needs.

CE 513 Youth Ministries in the Local Church (3 u)

This course provides a study of attitudes and need of modern youth; methods of reaching, teaching, and challenging young people.

CE 515 Methods and Materials for the Sunday School (3 u)

This course presents analysis of curriculum and related materials of the major publishing house as to doctrinal positions and practical usefulness in the church's educational program.

CE 505 Thesis Course (3 u)

4) Master of Divinity

(Total 96 units: Coursework-90 units and Thesis-6 units)

Purpose: The purpose of the Master of Divinity program is to train men and women for ministries in the church. Graduates of the program generally seek to become ordained ministers of instruction and leadership in the church.

Description: The program, however, is not designed to meet any course requirements for examination or licensure for ordained church ministry. Generally, the M.Div. program emphasizes spiritual formation and intellectual and professional development in exploring and communicating the Bible's instruction for faith and life. The curriculum is concentrated in three basic areas: the study of the Bible for knowledge of

its basic content; the study of theology for an understanding of the nature of the Christian faith and life; and the study of pastoral ministry for the development of ministry skills and styles. Students receive the Master of Divinity degree when they complete 96 units of course work, and the Bible Comprehensive Test. Students receive the Master of Divinity degree when they complete: a minimum of 6 semester units; Required Biblical Languages: (6) units; Required Bible Courses: (30) units; Required Theology Courses (24) units; Required Church History Courses: (12) units; Required Ministry Courses: (24) units. A minimum full-time course load is (12) units per semester. A maximum full-time load is (20) units per semester; however, students may petition for additional units if their cumulative average is 3.0.

Required Bible Languages (6 units)

LG 501 Hebrew I (3 u)

This Course focuses on grammar, syntax, and vocabulary of Hebrew and includes an analysis of the grammar of the Old Testament.

LG 502 Hebrew II (3 u)

This course is a continuation of grammar and vocabulary study, reading of Hebrew prose, and introduction to textual criticism.

LG 511 Greek I (3 u)

This course focuses on grammar, syntax, and vocabulary of Koine Greek and includes an analysis of the grammar of the New Testament.

LG 512 Greek II (3 u)

This course focuses on grammar and vocabulary. Selected passages in the Greek New Testament are used as examples for understanding the syntax.

Required Bible Study Courses (30 units)

OT 500 Old Testament Survey (3 u)

This course presents the content of Old Testament literature and various approaches for its interpretation. Both social and theological milieu of the Old Testament world will be introduced.

OT 502 Old Testament Literature (3 u)

This course examines the Old Testament, emphasizing information and skills that are necessary for an informed reading and faithful theological appropriation of this portion of scripture. Attention will be given to the literary, historical, cultural, and theological dimensions of the literature presented.

OT 511 Old Testament Theology (3 u)

This course provides a critical study of the Old Testament using biblical terminology, methodology, and analytical principles.

NT 500 New Testament Survey (3 u)

This course survey the New Testament, Its books, their authorship and the political, social, moral, and religious backgrounds of the New Testament and inter- testament periods.

NT 503 New Testament Interpretations (3 u)

This course presents a general introduction and hermeneutics of the New Testament, including its historical, cultural, and religious background. The principles and practice of New Testament exegesis also will be covered.

NT 511 New Testament Theology (3 u)

This course presents a comprehensive understanding of New Testament though in terms of theological issues and their trajectories in the NT itself. The primary method used is a historical-religious approach to analyze and synthesize theological ideas embedded in the NT.

NT 501 Gospels (3 u)

This course covers the Gospels of Mathew, Mark, Luke and John to help students to understand the true meaning of Jesus' teachings. It will explore the various

cultural, religious and social background related to Gospel interpretation.

NT 502 Paul's Epistles (3 u)

An introduction to the letters of Paul in their historical and cultural contexts, with focus on the application of theology to the cultural and social concerns presented therein.

BS 525 Kingdom of God (3 u)

This course analyzes the relationship between the Israelite kingdom and the Kingdom of God. An examination of these themes will be traced through historical texts, the Psalms, and the Prophets, as well as the Gospels and the Epistles.

Required Theology and Ethics (24 u)

TH 501 Systematic Theology(II): The Doctrine of God's Image(3 u)

This Course examines the doctrines of human and Scripture; the origin and nature of humankind; and the doctrine of fall and sin.

TH 502 Systematic Theology(III): Soteriology(3 u)

This course examines the doctrines of divine calling, regeneration, repentance, faith, justification, adoption, and sanctification will be detailed. Saved by God's grace will be instructed.

TH 503 Systematic Theology(IV): Christology(3 u)

This course examines the doctrine of divine election, the covenant of grace, and the person work of Christ the Mediator. Jesus is the perfect Son and Man as the Savior who redeems all sin of people.

TH 527 Postmodern Theology (3 u)

This course presents an historical and theological examination of the types of Christian belief systems emerging in the post-modern era, as found in the writings of contemporary theologians.

MS 547 Missiology (3 u)

The Biblical theories and methodologies of missions are presented in comprehensive detail, focusing especially upon the establishment of indigenous leaders in mission churches. Special attention will also be placed upon the many challenges missionaries face when pressing the Gospel in communist, Asian countries.

NS Practical Theology (3 u)

This course gives practical ministry formats for various church liturgies and services, as well as for overall congregational care, church administration and polity.

Church History Courses (6 u)**CH 548 World Church History 1 (3 u)**

This course is a survey of the main events and theological developments of the Christian church from the close of the New Testament era to the modern period.

CH 534 Korean Church History (3 u)

This course studies the beginnings of missionary outreach to mainland South Korea, its denominational developments, and expansion of the Korean Church throughout the world.

Required Ministry Courses (24 units)**BS 536 Prayer (3 u)**

This is a practical course that introduces the student to the major passages of Scriptures that discuss and analyze prayer, thanksgiving, praise, fasting and intercession.

CG 555 Cell Based Church (3 u)

This course offers an in depth study of small group ministries, as they relate to discipleship of the membership, evangelism and church growth. Select systems of mega Church Pastors will be detailed.

CL 556 Christian Leadership (3 u)

This course will survey the Biblical and ideal qualifications for Christian Leaders in Church and Para Church ministries, and how to effectively train leaders in the Church. Servant hood after the style of Jesus will be the basis of study.

CM 525 Youth Ministry (3 u)

This course is a study of youth ministry from event planning to methodology of youth ministries and includes input from several successful youth ministries and Christian educators.

CM 570 Church Planting (3 u)

This course will present the student with the best of contemporary insights from prominent and highly successful Church planters. Indigenous missions growth and development of satellite Churches will be detailed.

CM 578 Church and Society (3 u)

This significant class will familiarize the student with both basic and nonprofit corporate Law, which determines the interrelation of the Church to the government and society.

CO 557 Effective Communication (3 u)

This course studies the most effective ways of presenting ideas in written and oral presentations, reviewing the power of material organization, voice inflection and body language in speeches and sermons.

CO 555 Anthropology (3 u)

This course will introduce the student to means and ways of overcoming prejudice, language barriers, and differing cultural mores in settings where there are cohabitating diverse cultures. Emphasis will detail the basic differences between Western and Eastern cultures.

EM 577 Evangelism (3 u)

This course presents the biblical and theological basis for evangelism and includes the methods and message of converting non-believers to Christ.

EM 556 City Evangelism (3 u)

This course will acquaint the student with urban and mega Church growth programs, which constitute the Church as a community resource center, as a means to evangelistic outreach and growth.

EM 547 Effective Evangelism (3 u)

This course will study Evangelism in the New Testament and the early and contemporary Church, so as to prepare the student to train others for effective personal evangelism and orchestrate the Church membership into an evangelizing entity.

MS 577 Missiology (3 u)

This class will survey the qualifications necessary for becoming a missionary, how to raise necessary funds, and how to develop missions and indigenous church growth movements in foreign missionary settings.

MU 501 Fundamentals of Church Music (3 u)

This course is concerned with the fundamentals of church music, the principles of sacred music, and the practical applications of life and worship in the contemporary church. Also introduced are the elements of music including pitch

and rhythm symbols, meter and time signatures, melody, scales, intervals, and chord structure.

PM 522 Introduction to Christian Ministry (3 u)

This course explores biblical principles regarding the scope of pastoral ministry and includes preaching, teaching, counseling, administration, visitation, prayer meetings, church leadership, and stewardship.

PR 523 Introduction to Sermon Preparation / Homiletics (3 u)

This course introduces sermon preparation and delivery, the principles and practices of effective verbal communication, types of sermons, analysis of sermons by noted preachers, and outlining and structuring a sermon combined with adaptation to the audience.

PR 524 Sermon Delivery Practicum (3 u)

This course focuses on practicing the delivery of various types of sermons, vocal production, articulation, projection, and style in order to develop more effective communication skills.

RE 501 World Religions (3 u)

This course surveys and compares the major religions of Buddhism, Confucianism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Taoism and Christianity.

SD 577 Gifts of the Holy Spirit/Development (3 u)

This course details all the known gifts of the Holy Spirit as presented in the New Testament, the nature, purpose and administration of each, and how the student can flourish personally in the gifts and inspire others in their own.

SG 533 Discipleship (3 u)

This course is designed to equip the student with the ability to effectively teach and

exemplify the Word, so as to train and mature the various age groups of the local Church, using the models of Jesus with the disciples and Paul with Timothy and Titus.

SG 573 Small Group Bible Study (3 u)

This class will study the effective ways in which to develop small group Bible studies in the local Church, as a part of its Christian Education program, and as a means of developing dynamic and intimate support groups which strengthen Body life and essential follow-up ministries.

TH 501 Theology of Christian Life (3 u)

This course examines selected important aspects of Christian life including: regeneration, repentance, faith, reconciliation, sanctification, forgiveness, worship, evangelism, fellowship, stewardship, and freedom.

WM 587 Worship Renewal (3 u)

This class offers the student a continuing and advanced study of praise and worship as presented in the Old Testament, training the student how to develop more effective music ministry in the local Church, and as a means of using music and song to bring about renewal and church growth.

WM 523 Worship Practicum (3 u)

This class allows the student to apply the information and training learned from classes on praise and worship to his/her own church music ministry. The student will keep a journal regarding the music and songs and their styles selected during each weekly service, and the effects upon the congregational worshippers. The student will also be expected to develop a proposed program of worship and praise for every age group of the congregation, documenting the effectiveness in each case.

5) Master of Theology

(Total 48 units: Course work 42 units and Thesis 6 units)

Purpose: The Master of Theology program is designed to provide men who desire to further their pastoral or teaching ministry and opportunity for greater specialization in a particular theological discipline and for the development of skills in independent research and study in the student's chosen field. As a post-graduate degree, applicants for admission must have completed the Master of Divinity or its equivalent. This program assumes a certain degree of competence in the various fields of theology. Therefore, through the program an attempt is made both to integrate and to intensify the student's theological knowledge. This is accomplished through a greater use of bibliographical resources, methods and tools of scholarly research, and logical and critical writing.

Description: A student will select a major from one the five fields of study: Biblical Studies, Historical and Missions, Systematic Theology, Pastoral Theology, and Practical Theology. Students receive the Master of Theology degree when they complete a minimum of 42 semester units of course work, and 6 units of Thesis (including the class: Research Design); Required Biblical Languages: (6) units; Required Bible Courses: (6) units; Required Theology Courses (9) units; Required Ministry Courses: (21) units. A minimum full-time course load is (6) units per semester. A maximum full-time load is (12) units per semester; however, students may petition for additional units if their cumulative average is 3.0.

6) Doctor of Ministry

(Total 39 units: Course work 33 units and Dissertation 6 units)

Purpose: Purpose of the Doctor of Ministry program is to provide an advanced study in the practice of ministry for ordained ministers in the church or related ministries.

Description: This program combines an advanced biblical and theological

education with an advanced training in the classical pastoral disciplines of preaching, church growth, and leadership. Applicants must hold the Master of Divinity or its equivalent and have been engaged in significant professional ministry for at least three years after receiving a Masters of Divinity, or seven years of substantial ministry experience after completing a theological bachelor's degree.

Requirements for the doctoral degree are the successful completion of 33 semester units, which are offered in 8 semester courses, plus 6 units of doctoral thesis. Normally, four courses (16 units) are offered in the Summer and Winter Sessions, while 8 courses (33 units) are offered during the Fall and Spring Semesters. Students will normally take 5-10 courses each year and will complete all required course work in two years. Each doctoral course has three components: a pre-session assigned reading, a one-week session of lectures and a post-session report incorporating the reading, the lecture, and field experience. The special project/final dissertation may focus on the research of a critical issue, the development of a new program or an in-depth case study of a ministry situation.

This course is an advanced study of the dynamics of worship in terms of affecting spiritual renewal. It will consider the cultural trends and spiritual aspirations of church members, as well as apply worship as an effective instrument of evangelism and revival.

Ministry Courses (18 units)

PR 621 Sermon Issues (3 u)

This course will discuss how the relevancy of dynamic sermonizing can address the issues that are technically and seriously raised in pastoral ministry to the contemporary church.

CH 656 Historical Turning Points (3 u)

This course presents a critical, historical survey of the main turning points in Christian history that deeply impacted its growth and development. Particular emphasis will be placed upon reform and revival movements, and the effects of secular history upon theological formation and other church related issues from the 1st century to post modern times.

PM 650 Pastoral Issues (3 u)

This course explores the biblical, theological, and practical aspects of ministry within the Reformed tradition, with particular attention given to the content, interpretation and integration of contemporary church renewal with the ideals and practices of traditional, pastoral and theological ministrations.

PC 757 Contemporary Issues in Pastoral Counseling (3 u)

This course examines significant aspects of pastoral care and counseling directives, including theological, psychological, sociological, and spiritual perspectives on current ministry issues in the church's families and individuals.

CG 771 Strategies for Church Growth (3 u)

This course presents an analysis of how the principles of church growth affect each ministry, with special attention given to congregational types, leadership styles, contextual and cultural assessment, demographics, outreach, and assimilation.

BS 633 Text Development (3 u)

This course is an advanced study that will comprehensively examine how to derive the greatest meaning, significance and application of select Biblical texts, when speaking to some of the major congregational concerns facing the Church today.

CC 721 Pastor and Family Relationship (3 u)

This course will study the unique relationship the pastor, wife, and their children have to one another and with the other families of their congregation. Issues concerning the balance of time given to the pastor's own family and to his congregation, the setting of the pastor's family as an example to others, and the establishment of the pastor's familial boundaries with his congregation will be discussed in great, practical detail.

This course will practice and train how to write and organize the dissertation.

7) Doctor of Missiology**(Total 42 units: Course work 36 units and Dissertation 6 units)**

Purpose: Purpose of the Doctor of Missiology Program is to provide an advanced study in the practice of missions evangelism for ordained ministers in the church and

especially for missionaries in foreign fields.

Description: This program combines advanced biblical and theological education with an advanced training in mission evangelism strategies for preparation to enlarge in foreign missions. Applicants must hold the Masters of Divinity or its equivalent and have been engaged in significant professional ministry for at least three years after receiving a Masters of Divinity, or seven years of substantial ministry experience after completing a theological bachelor's degree.

Requirements for the doctoral degree are the successful completion of 36 semester units, which are offered in 9 semester courses, plus 8 units of doctoral thesis. Normally, four courses (15 units) are offered in the Summer and Winter Sessions, while 9 courses (36 units) are offered during the Fall and Spring Semesters. Students will normally take 5-10 courses each year and will complete all required course work in two years. Each doctoral course has three components: a pre-session assigned reading, a one-week session of lectures and a post-session report incorporating the reading, the lecture, and field experience. The special project/final dissertation may focus on the research of a critical issue, the development of a new program or an in-depth case study of a ministry situation.

An in depth study of how to establish and develop modern missionary churches into self-governing, self-supporting, self-propagating indigenous churches.

MS 670 Intercultural Communication (3 u)

This course examines the principles and processes of communication from one culture to another. Emphasis will be placed upon the need for Christian lifestyle modeling as a standard for disciplining, as well as the development of skills to

transfer concepts inter-culturally.

MS 675 Korean Mission History and Crucial Issues (3 u)

This course surveys the missionary movement of the Korean church from its origins to the present. Traditional and contemporary Korean methods of gospelization, missions' strategy and administration, and missionary training and selection, will be critically examined in light of evangelical missiology and standards of effectiveness.

MS 680 Challenges of Nationalism in Asian Missions (3 u)

A thorough study of Asian nationalism as it impacts Asian evangelism and missions. The effectiveness of various Western and Asian missionary strategies when meeting the challenge of Asian nationalism will be discussed, and how to use the phenomenon to promote indigenous mission churches.

MS 685 Strategies for Missions to North Korea (3 u)

This course surveys the social and cultural configuration, political economy and leadership, issues of famine, poverty, refugees, human rights and welfare systems in modern day North Korea, as a means to understanding the challenges facing missions. Strategies for promoting peace and reconciliation between North and South Korean will be studied.

MS 690 Missionizing Hindus (3 u)

This course seeks to provide a methodology and evaluation of various attempts of missionizing Indian and other South Asian Hindus. The study includes the comparison and contrasting of Hinduism and Christianity, and a survey of the most effective means of indigenous gospelization of the Hindus.

MS 695 Missionizing Muslims (3 u)

A study of the great contemporary challenges when missionizing Muslims, the

means of entering Muslim countries closed to missionaries, the main tenets of Muslim teaching hostile to Christianity, and the modern mindset of Muslim countries against Israel and the West.

This course explores how to write and organize the dissertation. Students will understand what they should write, why they need to write, and the like.

MRT 895 Dissertation (3 u)

This course focuses on the writing of the dissertation and may be repeated until the dissertation is completed.
